“ My earliest memories of Grama Mary take place on Longfellow. I remember every night she would sing Irish lullabies to me. She always encouraged me to be crafty: from her jar full of buttons, the box of fabric scraps, the basement box of wood pieces to hammer together, always loaded with construction paper & crayons, our dress up box, tons of dishes to "cook" outside with, letting me "paint" the house with a cup of water & a brush. I loved going to the fabric store with her to look at all the pretty material & patterns.

She would open the front door & pull all the shades back during a thunderstorm, yet another fond memory that has followed me into adulthood. She taught me how to garden, I planted radishes (ew), but was so proud when they grew. When I grew older, she would bribe me with ice cream sandwiches if I "volunteered" to say the rosary.

She was stern, she took no shit, but she also loved hugs & I knew that if she was watching TV, all I had to do was crawl on her lap for a free back scratch. She taught me to appreciate naps. I hated them then, but we always took them together. I probably spent hours playing in her jewelry box, admiring all the costume jewels & thinking they were real.

We would run errands, go to Sam's, listen to the oldies station. Speaking of Sam's, it was common knowledge that Grama Mary always kept enough food stocked in the pantry & basement to feed an army. If that bread was moldy, you better "cut the green parts off, it's still good". Expiration dates were mere suggestions to this Child of the Depression.

For a good chunk of my adult life, Grama couldn't understand the bond I had with my pets. It wasn't until her later years she finally got to enjoy the company of cats & you could tell that she genuinely loved them & appreciated them. It was one of the few things she would get very excited talking about on the phone, describing her cats & how they behaved. I'm grateful she got to experience pets at

least once.

As I grew older, we developed our differences & had less in common, but I've always loved my Grama Mary & have always valued everything she raised me into & taught me. She's always been the epitome of selfless, always caring for others, devoting more time to her church than possibly even the priests themselves. Most of her life was spent in some kind of service or volunteer work, when she wasn't playing handyman at home. (She hand-stripped ALL the wood at the Longfellow house!!)

I will always have my childhood memories, full of Grama Mary & everything she taught me, which will follow me until my own end. In the meantime, I will treasure them and learn from them, & I hope she finally caught up with Pacaw again.
